Homestead Program

The Homestead Credit Program can provide an additional cash benefit to homeowners and renters who meet eligibility criteria. This tax credit is designed to help eligible households meet the rising cost of property tax bills and rental payments. Adult Day Care

Adult Day Care consists of daytime care for functionally impaired elderly persons. It is provided through a structured program of social and rehabilitative services in a supportive group setting outside the client's home.

The fees for adult day services vary, generally between \$45 to \$65 per day, with additional fees for transportation. Adult Day Care and Hourly Respite are available through this agency.

Rock County Long Term Care Program Family Care

Rock County Long Term Support Programs are individualized programs that provide alternatives to nursing home care. These programs allow eligible individuals to remain in the community, often in their own homes, preserving their dignity and sense of self-respect. If remaining in the home is not possible, other non-institutional arrangements can be made.

Long Term Support Programs are designed to help people receive benefits from existing resources. A case manager will work with the recipient to develop an individualized service plan.

Benefits can include: adaptive equipment, supportive homecare, home health aides, skilled nursing, home modifications, home delivered meals, medication management, community-based residential facilities, personal care, respite care, social outings, lifeline, transportation, adult family homes, grocery shopping

Any person considering residence in a nursing home for any reason is invited to inquire about Long Term Support Services through the Rock County Aging and Disability Resource Center.

What is "Respite Care" For Family Caregivers?

"Respite" is for the caregiver. "Care" is for your loved one.

For many family caregivers, the challenges of caring for a loved one are part of daily life.

Caregiving is a demanding, difficult job and no one is equipped to do it alone. Getting help is essential for your health, and your resilience is critical for your loved one.

Respite care provides short-term breaks that relieve stress, restore energy, and promote balance in your life. Working/caring for family members or friends may be difficult, but there are many respite care options and strategies that you may not be aware of.

Respite Care Basics

Seeking support and maintaining one's own health is key to managing the caregiving years. Using respite care before you become exhausted, isolated, or overwhelmed is ideal, but just anticipating regular relief can become a lifesaver.

Respite can take many forms, but comes down to two basic ideas: sharing the responsibility for caregiving and getting support for yourself. Finding the right balance requires persistence, patience, and preparation.

Support Groups for Family Caregivers

These support groups enable persons facing similar problems to cope through the sharing of experiences, practical suggestions, and emotional support.

Wisconsin Family Caregiver Support Programs

Nearly everyone will be a caregiver at some point in life. And nearly everyone will need a little help providing that care. Being responsible for someone else can feel overwhelming, especially if the role is unexpected or interferes with job responsibilities. This is why Wisconsin offers family members and other informal caregivers access to programming and education that can make being a caregiver more manageable. Eligibility requirements vary for each program.

The National Family Caregiver Support Program (NFCSP) provides services and supports that help family caregivers and informal caregivers, such as a neighbor/friend, care for older adults at home. The NFCSP is available to any person providing care to an adult age 60+.

The Wisconsin Alzheimer's Family and Caregiver Support Program (AFSCP) is similar to the National Family Caregiver Support Program, but only serves people with a diagnosis of Alzheimer's disease or dementia.

Rock County Long Term Care Program (Continued)

Anyone who is a resident of Rock County and who has a long-term or irreversible illness or disability that substantially impairs his or her ability to function independently may be eligible. A brief listing of these conditions includes frail elderly, physically disabled, Alzheimer's or related diseases, other long-term illnesses or disabilities.

Persons needing Long Term Support services are encouraged to apply at any time and may refer themselves or have someone make a referral for them, such as a relative, doctor, social worker, pastor, friend, etc. At times, the demand for service exceeds the monies available in these programs. In those situations, names of eligible applicants are placed on a waiting list for service funding and are served as soon as funding becomes available.

Eligibility requirements vary for each program, but are generally based on the applicant's medical, functional, service and financial needs. The assessment to determine eligibility is free and does not obligate the applicant to receive services.

Elderly Benefit Specialist Program

Elderly Benefit Specialist Program in Rock County has one Specialist who provides services.

A Benefit Specialist is a person trained to help older persons who are having a problem with their private or government benefits. They are often called "red tape cutters" because they are experts at helping older persons with the extensive and complicated paperwork that is often required in benefit programs.

There is no charge for the services, but persons assisted by the program are encouraged to make a donation towards the cost of the service.

Power of Attorney for Health Care

The Power of Attorney for Health Care law allows you to complete a written document designating another person to act on your behalf as your health care agent. Subject to limitations you impose, the designated health care agent is authorized to make many types of health care decisions on your behalf should you later become incapacitated.

"Incapacitated" is defined in Wisconsin statutes as "the inability to receive and evaluate information effectively or to communicate decisions to such an extent that the individual lacks the capacity to manage his or her health care decisions."

A Power of Attorney for Health Care document states that when you are no longer able to make health care decisions due to being incapacitated, the person designated as your health care agent is authorized to make those decisions on your behalf.

A Power of Attorney for Health Care is different from a Living Will in that the Living Will functions as an actual statement directly from you to health care providers, indicating your wishes regarding feeding tubes and life-sustaining procedures in the event you ever have a terminal condition or are in a persistent vegetative state.

A Power of Attorney for Health Care takes effect upon your temporary or permanent incapacity. A Living Will also may take effect upon your temporary or permanent incapacity, but only if you also have a terminal condition or are in a persistent vegetative state.

Your local nursing home, area hospital or Council on Aging can provide you with information on getting started on Power of Attorney for Health Care.



Emergency Response System

Provides an in-home 24-hour electronic alarm system that enables homebound persons to summon emergency help. It gives peace of mind for older adults, their caregivers and family.

A button is worn by the individual and pushed in case of emergency. The system works through the telephone line and allows your loved one to speak directly to a specially trained attendant in the event of an emergency, at the push of a button. Affordable and easy-to-install, call button can be worn as a watch or necklace.

Telephone Reassurance Programs

Reassurance workers make regular contact through telephone calls with homebound older persons to assure their well-being and safety and to provide companionship and social interaction.

These volunteers are coordinated through RSVP. There is no cost for this program.

Independent Senior Housing

Independent senior housing is a residential living setting for senior adults that does not provide supportive services. Senior adults lead an independent lifestyle that requires minimal or no extra assistance. There are senior housing units that have government-subsidized rental programs. Those apartments are listed below and have a "#" in front of their name.

To apply for an apartment, contact the apartment manager and schedule a tour. Then, if the apartment is satisfactory, you can request to fill out an application and submit it back to manager of that apartment unit. Generally, in a government-subsidized apartment, it takes 30 days or more to receive an approval.

weakened condition increasing the likelihood of a life-threatening fall or injury. Diminished eyesight can also contribute to falls and car accidents if the person is still driving. Deafness decreases a desire to interact socially.

When a couple moves to an assisted living residence, chances are only one of them requires assistance. The move can be truly liberating for their partner, who has been caregiving 24/7. The caregiver's health and sleep is often compromised by stress and the physical demands involved in caring for their spouse. When these care needs are being handled by staff, the healthier spouse can go back to being more of a mate and less of a "nurse." A closer bond is re-established. Families have peace of mind. It's a win-win solution.

Some assisted living residents may be younger seniors (50-65 years old) that have been injured or had surgery requiring a rehabilitation period before being able to safely return to their home. Most assisted living residences have respite services available. Respite is a short-term, temporary living arrangement in a furnished studio apartment. Respite residents may receive occupational or physical therapy services onsite or may be bused to and from a rehabilitation facility. Living in a warm, caring environment rather than a clinical, hospital-like setting provides social opportunities and professional care at just a fraction of the cost of a hospital or nursing home.

Assisted living is NOT at all like a nursing home. It is just another type of residential setting available to meet the needs of many Americans in the golden years of their lives.

What is Assisted Living

It wasn't too many years ago when an older adult no longer able to perform all of the ADLs (activities of daily living) moved to a nursing home. If the person only needed assistance with dressing and bathing, but was mentally and emotionally healthy, these clinical, hospital-like surroundings often lead to depression, followed by a combination of further physical, mental and emotional declines.

That was then. Today, communities provide several types of assisted care. A Residential Care Apartment Complex (RCAC) is a type of residence providing a variety of options which may include meals, entertainment, activities, parties, religious services, beauty/barber, physician, podiatry, massage and transportation services. Certified RCACs qualify for Medicaid Waiver funding. Licensed RCACs do not qualify for funding.

Another type of assisted living facility is a Community Based Residential Facility (CBRF). Many similar services are provided here, as in an RCAC. However, a CBRF qualifies for both Community Options Program Waiver (COPW) and Medicaid Waiver funding. Often the types of amenities and activities are more limited in this type of facility.

A move to an assisted living residence can enhance quality of life, allowing a person to remain more independent for a longer period of time. It appears that too often families and individuals procrastinate, putting off a move to an assisted living residence due to lack of information about assisted living. As some people age, they become socially isolated and reclusive. Depression sets in, which can lead to nutritional deficiencies (either eating too much/not eating enough or not eating nutrient-rich foods), leading to a

Nutrition Counseling

Nutrition Counseling provides individualized advice and guidance to individuals or family caregivers who are at nutritional risk because of their health or nutritional history, dietary intake, medication use or chronic illness. Counseling may include options and methods for improving nutritional status and is provided by a health professional.

Hospice Services

Hospice is compassionate care for those who have a life-limiting illness and their family members. In addition to addressing the physical needs of the patients, hospice provides spiritual and emotional care to both the patients and their entire families. Hospice allows the patient to spend their final days in dignity and comfort.

All hospices must provide basic core services: nurse, social worker, chaplain, volunteer, nursing assistant, medications and supplies related to the terminal diagnosis. However, patients and their loved ones need to be aware that a hospice agency has a lot of latitude in determining services offered, so always remember to inquire about what is available.

WHY WOULD I WANT TO USE HOSPICE?

Hospice care may be appropriate if you or a loved one:

- Has been diagnosed with a life-limiting illness.
- Is experiencing pain and experiences frequent hospitalizations.
- Desires to remain at home and needs financial relief.
- Decides to forgo curative treatment.
- Requires frequent telephone calls, doctors office, or emergency room visits.

Hospice can provide:

- Expert relief of physical, emotional, and spiritual pain.
- The ability to stay at home and significant financial relief.
- Home visits, thereby decreasing the need for doctor or emergency room visits.
- Telephone support, offering expert advice and dispatching assistance when required.
- Respite care, to allow the caregivers the opportunity to rejuvenate
- Ongoing bereavement support for family and friends following the illness.

Most of the time, Medicare does not cover ongoing costs for in-home care, personal care, adult day care, cooking, cleaning, transportation and other costs associated with ongoing in home assistance.

Elder Abuse and Neglect

What do I do if I suspect someone is being abused or neglected or severely neglecting/harming themselves?

If you suspect an elder adult or adult at risk has experienced, is currently experiencing, or is at risk of experiencing abuse, neglect, self-neglect, or financial exploitation:

1. **IN AN EMERGENCY, AND/OR IF SOMEONE IS IN IMMEDIATE, LIFE-THREATENING DANGER, CALL THE POLICE OR 9-1-1 IMMEDIATELY.**
2. If not emergency, contact the Rock County ADRC at 741-3600.
3. If the alleged abuser is a paid caregiver employed by a long term care facility, contact the Division of Quality Assurance, Office of Caregiver Quality, Phone: 608-261-8319.

What will you be asked? You may give your name and address if you choose, *but you do not have to give this information.* You will be asked, but are not required to know, information about the adult at risk and the incident(s).

What will happen after you contact your county elder adults/adults-at-risk agency? A caseworker will respond to the report and determine what response is necessary.

In-Home Care Providers (Medical and Non-Medical)

There are two different types of in-home care service providers; medical home care and non-medical supportive home care. Some medical home care providers are able to provide both types of services. Non-medical home care providers only provide non-medical services. It is important to understand the difference between **non-medical home care** and **medical home care** in order to get the best care for your loved one.

Medical Home Health Care

Medical home health care makes it possible for some people to leave the hospital so they can recover at home or stay in their own homes rather than going into a nursing home and/or provide nursing services such as wound care. All home health agencies offer skilled nursing and home health aide services.

Home health agencies are state licensed and may provide skilled nursing, rehabilitation services, and personal care to individuals in their home. Services can include skilled nursing care, specific medical assistance, such as intravenous (IV) therapy or wound care, and home health aides to provide assistance with daily living. They may provide/arrange for medical social services, occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech therapy, personal care services, and other therapies. Home health services may be reimbursable through Medicare and Medicaid programs. Reimbursable services are limited and must be prescribed by a physician. Medicare certifies only agencies that offer skilled services. Personal care services may be covered if skilled nursing services are also being provided.

In-Home Care Providers (Continued) (Medical and Non-Medical)

Non-Medical Supportive Home Care

Non-medical supportive home care typically refers to non-medical services that assist individuals with activities of daily living, for example, simple tasks such as light housekeeping, laundry, shopping, meal preparation, opening a jar, or driving to appointments. Assistance may be provided with personal tasks such as bathing, dressing, grooming, toileting and even transferring from the bed to a chair. They may also provide "respite" type services for family caregivers.

Many types of individuals, including those who are trained and supervised by agencies, provide such services. In general, home care providers are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. They may work by themselves or as a team on a shift, part-time, hourly, live-in, or on an as-needed basis. Generally, Medicare and Medicaid do not pay for these types of services.

Generally, costs for services provided by a non-medical home care agency, costs can range from \$20 to \$45 per hour, and generally more per hour for nights, weekends and holidays.

As a family caregiver, it is helpful to establish a relationship with a non-medical home care agency before an emergency arises. That way, during your emergency/crisis you are set up with the agency, know what to expect and can get services immediately.
