COUNTY BOARD STAFF COMMITTEE
Minutes – May 14, 2019

Call to Order. Chair Podzilni called the meeting of the County Board Staff Committee to order at 4:00 P.M. in Conference Room N-1 on the fifth floor of the Rock County Courthouse-East.

Committee Members Present: Supervisors Podzilni, Bussie, Thomas, Brill, Peer, Yeomans and Mawhinney.

Committee Members Excused: Supervisors Bostwick and Sweeney.

Staff Members Present: Randy Terronez, Assistant to the County Administrator; Annette Mikula, Human Resources Director; Richard Greenlee, Corporation Counsel; Bridget Laurent, Deputy Corporation Counsel.

Others Present: Supervisor Wes Davis.

Approval of Agenda. Supervisor Podzilni said agenda item 8.A. will be moved before 7.A. Supervisor Yeomans moved approval of the amended agenda, second by Supervisor Thomas. ADOPTED.

Citizen Participation, Communications and Announcements. Supervisor Bussie said the Public Works Committee has set a tour of the parks for June 11th at 8:00 A.M. She asked for interested individuals to let her know. The tour will depart from the Public Works building. She will have Ms. Bondehagen, Office Coordinator for Administration, put a notification in Supervisor's packets with the tour information. The naming of the new park will be on their next agenda. She praised the work of the new Community Coordinator. Supervisor Davis said at the recent Public Works Committee meeting, townships expressed their gratitude for the positive atmosphere at the Department of Public Works.

Approval of Minutes – April 23, 2019. Supervisor Bussie moved approval of the minutes of April 23, 2019 as presented, second by Supervisor Yeomans. ADOPTED.

Transfers. None.

Review of Payments. The committee accepted the reports.

Committee Action and Updates.

Proposed Changes to the Rock County Administrative Policy 5.31 Overtime, Flex and After Hours Payments. Ms. Mikula said there will be a vacancy in the Food

Service Manager position. Whenever a vacancy occurs, they take the opportunity to review the position. She is recommending the Food Service Manager be changed to a Unilateral C employee. Supervisor Thomas moved approval of the proposed change to the Rock County Administrative Policy 5.31 Overtime, Flex and After Hours Payments, second by Supervisor Peer. ADOPTED.

Resolutions.

Recognizing David Hayes for Service to Rock Haven.

“NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Rock County Board of Supervisors duly assembled this ___ day of _____, 2019, does hereby recognize David Hayes for his 25 years, 2 months of service and extend their best wishes to him in his future endeavors.”

Supervisor Brill moved approval of the above resolution, second by Supervisor Peer. ADOPTED.

In Support of Reforming Wisconsin’s Eminent Domain Laws.

“NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Rock County Board of Supervisors duly assembled this ___ day of _____, 2019 does hereby request that the State of Wisconsin establish a special legislative commission on the use of eminent domain in order to allow the state legislature to pursue a change of law for the protection of its citizens’ private property rights.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution will be forwarded to the Governor, Wisconsin State Legislature, the Public Service Commissioners and to the Wisconsin Counties Association.”

Supervisor Brill moved approval of the above resolution, second by Supervisor Peer.

Supervisor Davis explained the resolution and that he has been working on this resolution for the last four years. He said time is of the essence on this resolution as there is a June 21st deadline to submit for the WCA conference. The Farm Bureau supports this resolution along with several other organizations. It has been many years since this law has been reviewed. Supervisor Yeomans was concerned with the wording on lines 8 and 9 which removes private companies from eminent domain. He said many private companies make a positive impact as well. He was also concerned with the wording on line 15 requiring a jury trial.

ADOPTED on the following vote: YES – Supervisors Podzilni, Mawhinney, Brill, Bussie, Peer, Thomas; NO – Supervisor Yeomans; ABSENT – Supervisors Sweeney and Bostwick.

Amending the Rules of Procedure for the Rock County Board of Supervisors.

“NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Rock County Board of Supervisors, duly assembled this ___ day of _____, 2019, resolves that the Rock County Board Rules of Procedure be amended as follows:

RULE IV

* * *

G. Appointments to committees, commissions and boards shall be made by the Chair, including chairships subject to County Board confirmation. The Chairs of all standing committees shall be County Board members. Vice Chairships shall be elected by the committee membership. Supervisors shall be limited to service on a standing committee to two consecutive full terms of two years, after which, members drawn may serve additional terms under the preceding limitation after absence from a standing committee for not less than one year. Terms shall commence upon appointment immediately following the organizational meeting and end upon the first County Board Meeting following the succeeding organizational meeting. Vacancies during the term of any committee member shall be filled by the County Board Chair with confirmation by the County Board. If practicable, this shall be done within 30 working days of the date on which the vacancy was created.

RULE V

C. Board of Health

(1) The Board of Health shall be composed of nine (9) members, of which four (4) shall be County Board Supervisors. At least three (3) of the members shall be persons who are not elected officials or employees of Rock County and who have a demonstrated interest or competence in the field of public health or community health. A good faith effort shall be made to appoint a registered nurse and a physician. Members shall also reflect the diversity of the community. The members of the body drawn from the community shall serve terms of three years, and be limited to service of two consecutive full terms, after which, members drawn from the community may serve additional terms under the preceding limitation after absence from the board of not less than one year.

(2) The Board of Health shall have policy supervision over the Health Department. The Health Department shall include the activities of the public health nurses, environmental health (including pollution control), and powers and responsibilities

conferred by State Statute and County Board policy. The Board of Health shall also act as liaison for community health planning.

J. Human Services Board

(1) The Human Services Board shall be comprised of six County Board Supervisors and three other Rock County residents. The members of the body drawn from the community shall serve terms of three years, and be limited to service of two consecutive full terms, after which, members drawn from the community may serve additional terms under the preceding limitation after absence from the board of not less than one year.

(2) The Human Services Board shall have policy supervision over the Human Services Department including, but not limited to: The Aging and Disability Resource Center; Behavioral Health Services, Child Protective Services, Economic Support Services, and Juvenile Justice Services.

(3) The Human Services Board shall provide policy supervision for the Rock County Job Center.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this amendment to the Rock County Board Rules of Procedure shall be effective and construed such that the first term of each supervisor or citizen member shall be counted from the next organizational meeting forward.

Supervisor Mawhinney moved approval of the above resolution, second by Supervisor Podzilni.

The committee asked Mr. Greenlee the process if the motion on this resolution had no second. Mr. Greenlee explained the process. Supervisor Podzilni withdrew his second on the motion.

DEAD due to a lack of a second.

Executive Session. Supervisors Yeomans and Thomas moved to go into Executive Session at 4:30 P.M. per Section 19.85(1) (g), Wis. Stats. – Confer with Legal Counsel Regarding Potential Litigation. ADOPTED on a roll call vote with the following: AYES – Supervisors Thomas, Bussie, Brill, Yeomans, Peer, Mawhinney and Podzilni. ABSENT – Supervisors Bostwick and Sweeney.

Supervisor Bussie moved to go out of Executive Session at 4:49 P.M., second by Supervisor Thomas. ADOPTED.

Adjournment. Supervisor Brill moved adjournment at 4:49 P.M., second by Supervisor Mawhinney. ADOPTED.

TO RECOGNIZE STEVE HARE

1 **WHEREAS**, Steve Hare has served the citizens of Rock County for over twenty-eight (28) years as a
2 dedicated and valued employee of Rock County; and,
3

4 **WHEREAS**, Mr. Hare began his career in Human Services on September 24, 1990 in the Child
5 Protective Services Division as an Ongoing Case Worker. In this role he assisted parents and children
6 to maintain family unity by ensuring abuse and neglect were no longer apart of the environment. Mr.
7 Hare supported parents in their homes and met with children in the schools to talk about their daily
8 lives making sure they were no longer mistreated; and,
9

10 **WHEREAS**, Mr. Hare transitioned into the Juvenile Probation Division as an Intensive Aftercare
11 Worker on December 11, 1991 to work under a grant which provided intensive support and extensive
12 supervision to youth who were released from institutions and now living in the community. Mr. Hare
13 was the liaison between the State and county workers developing discharge plans and assisting county
14 staff to implement the plans effectively. Mr. Hare also had to provide the courts disposition reports
15 indicating if he felt the child needed additional support such as out-of-home placement, electronic
16 monitoring, or corrections; and,
17

18 **WHEREAS**, when the grant ended in February 1993, the concept of the grant was maintained and Mr.
19 Hare was hired into a permanent position as an Intensive Supervision Worker. Mr. Hare's role and
20 focus changed some in that more emphasis was placed on prevention and working with youth *before*
21 they entered institutions. Mr. Hare's caseload and attention was with youth from northern Rock County
22 keeping them on track and avoiding placement; and,
23

24 **WHEREAS**, on October 11, 1999, Mr. Hare accepted a position within the Juvenile Justice Division
25 in the Electronic Monitoring Program where he worked with youth who were court ordered to
26 participate in a monitored bracelet program. Mr. Hare set up the bracelets, organized the schedules and
27 followed-up with the schools and parents making sure youth were following program rules; and,
28

29 **WHEREAS**, on March 4, 2004, Mr. Hare moved to the Long Term Support Division as a Waiver case
30 manager for elderly and physically disabled adults. Mr. Hare completed wait list assessments,
31 functional screens, developed service plans, coordinated service delivery, and on occasion, completed
32 elder abuse investigations. In this role, Mr. Hare ensured the health, safety, and dignity of his clients in
33 the community as opposed to nursing home care. By October 2005, Mr. Hare accepted a Supervisor
34 position within the same division taking on the role of assisting Waiver case managers in their day-to-
35 day functions; and,
36

37 **WHEREAS**, on March 4, 2013, Mr. Hare accepted the position as Supervisor of the Aging and
38 Disability Resource Center-a new division of Rock County. Mr. Hare was instrumental in the
39 development and implementation of ADRC policies and procedures, the training of new staff and
40 making the ADRC what it is today. His supervisory role of the Information and Assistance staff and
41 clear understanding of what the ADRC does for the community has helped to shape the positive
42 reputation it encompasses today; and,
43

44 **WHEREAS**, Mr. Hare has decided to retire from Rock County after 28 years of dedicated service on
45 June 7, 2019; and,
46

47 **WHEREAS**, Mr. Hare has shown a variety of skill and knowledge for both the clients he has served
48 and the staff he has worked with in Rock County; and,

**IN SUPPORT OF INCREASED 2019-21 STATE BUDGET FOR COUNTY CHILD
SUPPORT FUNDING**

- 1 **WHEREAS**, Rock County Child Support Agency administers the Child Support Enforcement Program
- 2 on behalf of the state, providing services to Rock County residents including paternity establishment,
- 3 obtaining child support and health insurance orders for children, and enforcing and modifying those
- 4 orders; and
- 5
- 6 **WHEREAS**, our children’s well-being, economic security and success in life are enhanced by parents
- 7 who provide financial and emotional support; and
- 8
- 9 **WHEREAS**, Rock County’s Child Support Agency ensures that parents take responsibility for the care
- 10 and well-being of their children, supports the involvement of parents in their children’s lives and provides
- 11 services to both custodial and noncustodial parents; and
- 12
- 13 **WHEREAS**, the Child Support Enforcement Program is an effective investment in Wisconsin’s future as
- 14 child support increases self-sufficiency, reduces child poverty, and has a positive effect on children’s
- 15 well-being; and
- 16
- 17 **WHEREAS**, Wisconsin’s Child Support Enforcement Program is ranked 2nd in the nation for collecting
- 18 current support; and
- 19
- 20 **WHEREAS**, Wisconsin’s Child Support Enforcement Program is incredibly cost-effective, collecting an
- 21 average of \$5.56 in support for every dollar invested in the program; and
- 22
- 23 **WHEREAS**, county child support agencies collected \$934 Million in child support during 2017, 95% of
- 24 which went directly to families while 5% reimbursed public assistance programs; and
- 25
- 26 **WHEREAS**, child support agencies help save taxpayer dollars by establishing health insurance orders for
- 27 97% of cases, which reduces state Medicaid costs by moving children from public assistance to private
- 28 insurance; and
- 29
- 30 **WHEREAS**, state funding for county child support services has failed to keep up with county agency
- 31 costs, which have steadily increased due to growing caseloads, inflation and new federal regulations; and
- 32
- 33 **WHEREAS**, Wisconsin’s strong performance in child support is at risk without additional state funding.
- 34 Diminished performance would result in reduced federal funding to Wisconsin; and
- 35
- 36 **WHEREAS**, decreased federal funding would lead to less funding for Rock County’s child support
- 37 agency. This could lead to reductions in child support enforcement staff and services and reduced child
- 38 support collections; and
- 39
- 40 **WHEREAS**, new state investments in child support are amplified by a generous federal match. Every \$1
- 41 of state GPR invested in the Child Support Program generates \$2 in federal matching funds.
- 42



47 investment will ensure that counties can continue to effectively provide economic support to our children.

50 Governor of the State of Wisconsin, State Senators and State Representatives representing Rock County,



**ENDORISING THE ACCEPTANCE OF MEDICAID EXPANSION FUNDS AND
PLACING HEALTHCARE ADVISORY REFERENDUM ON THE
SPRING 2020 COUNTY BALLOT**

1 WHEREAS, the Affordable Care Act ("ACA") established a program of Medicaid expansion
2 whereby in exchange for increased federal matching funds, states could elect to expand the number of
3 individuals covered under state administered Medicaid programs; and,
4

5 WHEREAS, historically the State of Wisconsin has refused the Medicaid expansion funds created
6 by the ACA; and,
7

8 WHEREAS, through the 2013-2015 biennium budget, the number of individuals covered by
9 Wisconsin's Medicaid program was expanded to include certain childless adults with incomes at or below
10 100% of the Federal Poverty Level. This partial expansion increased coverage under the State's Medicaid
11 program, but was insufficient to qualify for the increased federal reimbursement funds under the ACA;
12 and
13

14 WHEREAS, Medicaid expansion funds continue to be available for states that elect to expand
15 eligibility requirements, and would expand health insurance coverage to an additional 82,000 parents and
16 childless adults; and,
17

18 WHEREAS, the Legislative Fiscal Bureau estimates that if the State moved to full expansion on
19 January 1, 2020, the State of Wisconsin would save \$279,400,000 over the next biennium because the
20 Federal government would pay over 90% of the costs of coverage for many current BadgerCare
21 recipients; and,
22

23 WHEREAS, 19 counties, including Rock County, have passed resolutions urging Wisconsin to
24 accept Medicaid expansion funds, a position that has been adopted by the Wisconsin Counties
25 Association; and,
26

27 WHEREAS, currently 37 states, including the District of Columbia, have accepted Medicaid
28 expansion, including all of Wisconsin's Midwestern neighbors – Iowa, Illinois, Minnesota, and Michigan.
29

30 WHEREAS, the decision to not accept federal Medicaid funds directly impacts the citizens of
31 Wisconsin, and the voters of Rock County who should be able to provide an advisory opinion to support
32 or oppose the acceptance of these Federal Medicaid funds.
33

34 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Rock County Board of Supervisors duly
35 assembled this ___ day of _____, 2019 does hereby support and endorse the acceptance of Medicaid
36 Expansion funds by the State and urges the legislature to accept such funds as a part of the 2019-2021
37 biennium budget.
38

39 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Rock County Board of
40 Supervisors does hereby direct the Rock County Clerk to place the following advisory referendum
41 question on the countywide ballot at the election to be held on April 7, 2020:

ENDORISING THE ACCEPTANCE OF MEDICAID EXPANSION FUNDS AND PLACING
HEALTHCARE ADVISORY REFERENDUM ON THE SPRING 2020 COUNTY BALLOT

42 "Should the State of Wisconsin accept Affordable Care Act Federal Medicaid funds

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

Dental Services for Incarcerated Inmates

After we received the final contract in March of this year, we began tabulating the costs associated with the inmates and the number of inmates we have seen. Between August and February 1 of this year, we have seen 28 inmates, and continuing scheduling for the last Tuesday of every month. We have performed 128 procedures on these patients, which has helped save the county \$13,609.00 according to our fee schedule.

General Health & Dental Services for County Clients

As of yet, we have had 6 clients utilizing our medications. 4 out of the 6 patients referred to HealthNet were provided continuing medications/services for mental illnesses such as, but not limited to, bipolar disorder, schizophrenia, and major depressive disorder.

We have not received communication from Harper's Place on referral of clients.
